

COLIN MONTGOMERIE (-9)

Q. Tell me how you feel. Tied for the lead at this moment.

COLIN MONTGOMERIE: Yeah. I enjoyed playing with Jim Furyk, I must admit. A gentleman and someone I've admired for many, many years since we first came across Jim in '97 at Valderrama at the Ryder Cup and I've always admired his game and it's great to play with him here in America. Look forward to tomorrow really, yeah. I'm going to play with Jim again, I believe, so yeah, I enjoy playing with him and Fluff, lovely fellow. We've gotten on for many years.

Q. You've obviously won a few times in your career. You probably haven't forgotten how to do it, right?

COLIN MONTGOMERIE: Let's hope not, eh? Let's hope not. If I don't win tomorrow, I'll have forgotten how to do it, how's that, you know? But what the hell, it's great to come here, a long way from home, you know, from London. We flew over here on Tuesday to Seattle direct and long way, so I'm glad I'm making a run anyway and I look forward to tomorrow.

Q. Are you surprised at how well you've played this week, because you don't always play that well here?

COLIN MONTGOMERIE: No, I've holed out quite well, I've holed out well. The last couple of putts there were great, a couple of eight-footers for birdies and that was key, you know, to birdie 17 and 18. So I've holed out well. If I can hole out tomorrow, Jim's the guy. Jim's very, very steady and doesn't do anything wrong. He's the guy to beat, but if I can hole out, I have a chance.

Q. It's funny, yesterday you were missing a couple putts and now you don't miss anything.
